Correction to 2005 Annual Report

We would like to call your attention to an error on page 33 of the annual report, which discusses the most recent inventory of Sealaska's timber resources. The chart at the top of the page should not have been included in the report. The chart does not represent the current best information available to the Corporation regarding timber inventory. However, the text on page 33 and elsewhere in the report concerning timber is accurate and is important to you as a shareholder. Please disregard the chart and we apologize for any confusion this error may have caused.

33rd Annual Meeting on June 10

Sealaska's 33rd annual shareholder meeting will be held at The Westin Bellevue Hotel in Bellevue, Wash. on June 10, 2006. Shareholders will see a presentation detailing the independent auditor's report published in the 2005 annual report, hear about Sealaska's 2005 financial performance, corporate strategy and an update on Sealaska Heritage Institute activities. Five directors will also be elected to the Sealaska Board for three-year terms.

For the fourth year in a row, the Sealaska annual meeting will also be available via live webcast. Last year, a record number of shareholders participated using the webcast and we encourage all shareholders who are unable to attend the meeting in person to register. Information on how to register for this year's webcast will be available at www.sealaska.com in the coming weeks.

On April 17, the 2005 Sealaska annual report and proxy materials were mailed to shareholders. Below is a step-by-step guide on how to fill out your proxy:

1. Sign and Date the Proxy – At the bottom of the card is a section

you must fill out to ensure that your vote is counted.

2. Contribution Box – If you so desire, you may contribute your \$25 voting incentive to Sealaska Heritage Institute by filling out this box.

3. Vote Your Proxy – There are three ways that you can vote your proxy: directed, discretionary and quorum only. Please see the sidebar on the advisory resolutions passed to preserve discretionary voting on page four. For further detail on each voting option, please see your proxy packet.

4. Board of Directors' Nominees – The Sealaska Board of Directors endorses these nominees. You may vote directed or discretionary for these candidates.

5. Independent Nominees – These nominees are qualified independent candi-

dates who are not endorsed by the board of directors. You may only vote directed for these candidates.

6. Write-In – In this section, you may write in the name of any qualified nominee, then indicate the number of directed votes you cast for that nominee.

Please see the proxy packet that has been mailed to you for more detailed information. We hope you will participate in this year's annual meeting. Your thoughts and your vote make a difference.

Solicitation by the Board of Directors for the 2006 Annual Meeting

I hereby appoint as my attorney in fact and proxy: Sidney Edenshaw, Byron Michien, and Edward Thomas (Proprietors), a majority of them, or any one of them acting in the absence of the others, with full powers of substitution, to attend the Annual Meeting of Shareholders of Sealaska Corporation to be held in Bellevue, Washington on June 10, 2006, at 1:00 p.m., and any adjournment or postponement thereof, and to vote for or against Sealaska Corporation and its officers, with all the powers that I will possess if present at the meeting, all as described in the Notice of Meeting and Proxy Statement, both dated April 19, 2006, receipt of which is acknowledged. If this proxy is signed and no specific direction is given, this proxy will be voted in the discretion of the Board of Directors, and in the discretion of the proxyholder's spouse such other matters as may present themselves before the meeting.

3 Steps for Filling out the Proxy?

- Choose one of the following three ways to **Vote Your Proxy**: Discretionary, Directed or Quorum only.
- Decide which way you would like to **Vote for Directors**. If you decide to vote directed, allocate your votes in the spaces provided.
- **Sign and Date Your Proxy**, and mail or fax it to the Independent Inspectors of Election.

Vote Your Proxy

Discretionary – Your votes will be voted for candidates on the Board of Directors' slate. You need not allocate your votes below. The Corporation will distribute your votes among its slate at the discretion of the Proxyholders as appointed above. The Board of Directors' nominees will be elected for three-year terms ending 2009. Be sure to sign and date your proxy. If you wish to withhold authority to vote the discretionary proxy for one or more of the board slate nominees in particular, cross out the name of that nominee and none of your shares will be voted for him or her.

Directed – If you wish to direct specific numbers of votes to certain nominees, either within the Board of Directors' slate or among the listed independent nominees, write the number of votes you wish to give to each nominee next to that nominee's name. Vote for no more than a total of five nominees. You have five votes for every share you own. For example, if you have 100 shares, you have 500 votes. If any of the nominees withdraws or for good cause will not serve, his or her directed votes will not be redirected to any other candidate.

Quorum Only – If you wish to withhold authority to vote, your proxy will be counted for quorum purposes only. If you check this box, no nominee will receive any of your votes, unless you have also checked the discretionary voting box or cast directed votes.

Letter from the CEO

The theme for Celebration 2006 is "Reflections of Our Ancestors in the Faces of Our Children," honoring the spirit of our ancestors and special bond between those who came before and each generation yet to come. I hope you will be able to join us in the festivities celebrating our Tlingit, Haida and Tsimshian cultures.

But in addition to these exciting events, Sealaska also continues to face new challenges. Our board and management are working diligently to implement our new business strategy. We continue to push for final land conveyances under the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act (ANCSA), and are adjusting to a new balance of resources with a 25% reduction in timber harvests in 2006 and efforts focused on diversification.

As described in our annual report that you received in the mail, as an Alaska Native corporation, Sealaska has unique opportunities in government contracting and providing goods and services to large private sector corporations. Aggressively moving into new investment sectors that can maximize these advantages is at the core of our diversification strategy.


But as some of you may know, the Government Accountability Office (GAO) has recently questioned the ANCSA 8(a) contracting benefits. The GAO released a report evaluating the challenges and successes of ANCSA companies under the Small Business Administration (SBA) 8(a)

business development program.

The report asserts SBA's inadequate oversight and management of the 8(a) initiatives, while also determining that ANCSA companies have not used improper business strategies or methods under the program. The SBA indicated that the 8(a) program is working exactly as Congress intended.

Sealaska continues to work with other ANCSA corporations to ensure that Alaska Natives are given the benefits we deserve as minority-owned businesses. The core mission of our Native corporations includes generating community-wide benefits and meeting social and cultural needs of their economically and socially disadvantaged communities. ANCSA-owned 8(a) companies provide many benefits to shareholders, including higher skilled and higher paying jobs, scholarships and training. We will continue to deliver this message as we move forward to support our people.

Confirmation Letters Sent to Landless Shareholders

Sealaska Corporation will be sending a letter to the shareholders whom our records indicate were originally enrolled to Landless communities. This letter requests permission to release the information on Landless shareholders to the Landless representatives listed below. When ANCSA was enacted in 1971, five Southeast Alaska communities – Haines, Tenakee Springs, Petersburg, Wrangell and Ketchikan - were excluded from corporation status and

therefore were not guaranteed title to any lands. Legislation has been introduced in the U.S. Congress to recognize the Landless communities under ANCSA, but has not yet passed. Due to interest in this legislative activity, many Sealaska shareholders have been questioning their Landless status. If you receive this letter, please follow the instructions and complete this form. The Landless representatives cannot act on behalf of the Landless shareholders

without this permission. Sealaska Corporation can only confirm the community to which our original shareholders were enrolled. If you have any other questions concerning the Landless issue, you must contact the Landless representative for your community, listed below.

Landless Communities Fight for Justice

The five Alaska Native communities unrecognized by ANCSA: Ketchikan, Wrangell, Tenakee Springs, Petersburg and Haines, are still working to gain ANCSA corporate status. During the last year, congressional delegates Senator Lisa Murkowski and Representative Don Young introduced bills in congress that call for their inclusion in the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act as Alaska Native Corporations.

To date, Sealaska has contributed approximately \$1,000,000 to recognition efforts, and continues to support the Southeast Alaska ANCSA Land Acquisition Coalition.

Tlingit Artist Preston Singletary Featured in Annual Report

The glass piece, "Red Wolf Hat," by Preston Singletary, world-renowned, award-winning artist and Sealaska shareholder, was featured on the cover of this year's annual report.

Singletary, who was born in San Francisco and resides in Seattle, first studied glass artistry at Pilchuck Glass School in Stanwood, Washington and went on to be recognized internationally for his methods of utilizing the contemporary medium of glass to express traditional Tlingit formline design. and textures onto a surface, thus creating an innovative and captivating art form.

In addition to creating art, he teaches and lectures extensively. His piece, "Naatsilanei," crafted from blown and sandcarved glass, won first place in the Contemporary Art category at Celebration 2004's juried art show.

Odin Lonning (Tlingit name Sh'now Taan) is an award-winning, professional Native artist from Juneau, Alaska. He is Woosh Ke Taan

(Eagle/Shark) Clan

through his Tlingit mother, and shares the name of his Norwegian father.

In the mid-1970s, the Juneau Centennial Committee, Juneau School District, Goldbelt Corporation, and Sealaska Corporation commissioned works by Odin

for permanent display. Sealaska was honored to work with Odin again on the 2005 annual report, and featured a photo of the Raven and the Box of Daylight drum crafted by Odin.

"I first started working with this design over 10 years ago. For my own interests as an artist I make the design different every time. This is one of many versions."

Odin was motivated to explore Tlingit art when he saw his first traditional dance performance at age 10. Local Native artists, culture centers and museums in Southeast Alaska also inspired him. Since

then, he attended the Institute of American Indian Art in Santa Fe, New Mexico, has won multiple awards, and carved totem poles and house posts for clients in Chicago, Portland and Paris. Odin's current works in both traditional and contemporary media include carved totem poles, boxes, wall panels, masks, paddles and bowls, and painted and regalia designs on numerous media including drums, canvas, paper, hardwood, leather, glass and copper.
